A popular Backwell café celebrates its first birthday.

Many will remember last Easter when Heaven Coffee House opened its doors for the first time and the queues stretched out of the door. The prominent corner location, with its expansive windows, has had many occupants over the years but now serves as a popular café delivering excellent coffee alongside other delights like bubble tea, smoothies and delicious cakes. Its proprietor, Ian Howlett (featured on the front cover), has experience of starting up coffee shops as well as other enterprises. He ran a "pop-up" coffee shop in a large venue in Taunton, filling it with comfy sofas, and has also been involve in a number of "tech start-ups".

So, what drew him to opening a coffee shop in Backwell? Ian describes his passion for great coffee, alongside his experience with start-ups, as coming together in a perfect storm when the opportunity presented itself for a coffee business in Backwell. Having lived in the area for some time, Ian moved away, then on his return he was at first drawn to the old Mica site which is still waiting for some TLC. But when the building opposite – now his coffee house – became available he felt sure this was providence guiding him forward.

Setting up a new business is never easy and, as lan says, "there is always so much more to do", but Heaven has found success as a place to meet and it fills up regularly. Coffee shops are often rather dark, but the large windows give a bright, airy feel as the light pours in.

Highlights for Ian over the last year include introducing Bagel-inies to the village and the first open mic night, which are now continuing monthly, as well as the joy of working with excellent staff and making new friends who visit the shop. Ian acknowledges he has been very blessed with his staff and is delighted with the 5-star hygiene rating. He really values the quality of his coffee, roasted by "Extract" in Bristol and served, he says, with love.. and great latte art! Probably the biggest challenge is the lack of parking, an issue that will ring true with many businesses in Backwell.

Plans for the next year include revamping the menu to provide afternoon tea and encouraging more community groups like 'Work from Heaven', or the adopters' group, to meet here regularly. This is something Ian is keen to support. Hopefully, the Art Wall may blossom too.

When asked if he was still happy that he had chosen to start a coffee shop in Backwell, Ian answered "Yes, I wouldn't have it any other way". His advice for any other entrepreneurs wanting to start their own business was "be prepared for struggles, but follow your passions".

Parish Council Meeting – March 2024

Grove Farm. 1280 comments from residents objecting to the proposal have been logged on the North Somerset Council (NSC) Planning page. Councillors hope that this exceptionally high number of objections from the resident population will be taken into



consideration when the proposal is discussed. Councillors thanked Backwell Residents' Association and Backwell Resistance for their hard work which was responsible for boosting the number of comments. **Farleigh Fields**. Councillors were told that there is an update regarding the development. On the vacant piece of land not yet allocated, there are to be discussions regarding the positioning and upkeep of the proposed fence, and care of the local ecology there. Councillors were also made aware that Persimmon Homes are consulting with NSC to have the west field which they own included in the NSC Plan. This will be closely watched by the Parish Council. Rodney Road The outline planning has been approved, but there are no details yet about site access. Gleeson Development south of Nailsea This application is still live but has been delayed by six months. **Draft Local Plan** The Parish Council are monitoring the progress of the draft and have made comments regarding issues relating to Backwell. This will be continued. Active Travel Strategy There was no update regarding the bus lane plans along Farleigh Road. Planning Applications There were six planning applications, five of which were supported. However, concerns were expressed about an extension plan in Westfield Drive due to 'overlooking' issues with

Highways Councillors continue to press for the introduction of a 20mph speed limit in Downside. The Airport have agreed to fund signage etc if it is approved by NSC.

another dwelling.

There has been no decision about the proposal to introduce a 40mph speed limit in Backwell Common and Backwell Bow.

Other matters Councillors were pleased to hear that a new apple tree is to be planted on Council owned land by the Backwell Club. This will replace one which had suffered with mistletoe damage.

The clock in the Village Hall has been repaired with financial assistance from the Parish Council.

The work to place an inscription on the Jubilee Stone marking King Charles' Accession has been approved. There is no update regarding the footpaths across and around the 'Jubilee' field. Cllr Power will make further enquiries with NSC and report at the next meeting.

Vacancies There are vacancies on the Parish Council for anyone wishing to take on the interesting and fulfilling role of Councillor. The role is suitable for both working and non-working people, with matters arising being shared subject to people's availability and/ or spare time. Get Down And Dirty!



Troubleshooting Composting Issues with Backwell Climate Action Group.

Making your own compost is great for soil, great for the environment, and saves on money and waste. It is a closed loop system where you produce

the waste from kitchen and garden, which you then process (composting), and end up with a useful product which is great for your garden. No transport emissions and costs, no single-use plastics, reduced reliance on peat....it feeds the soil and the soul. But some have issues, which cause them to give up, when they are usually easily solved.....

Slow process - this is often due to a low temperature in the heap. It could be that your 'heap' is too small, so heat is lost quickly to the environment. Getting close to one cubic meter will help. Smaller heaps will benefit from insulation (cardboard or straw down the sides of a bin, or even waste insulation sheets or polystyrene from building work (as long as they don't shed micro plastics). A slow process can also be due to a lack of oxygen. Turning or stirring your heap will often kick start the breakdown of the contents, but can be a major effort. Repeatedly spiking the heap with a broom handle or cane (from top to bottom) is nearly as good, as it provides channels for oxygen into the heap.

Slimy/smelly compost heap - Often too much high nitrogen 'green' material. Green material is often, but not always, green (!) Examples - soft prunings/non-woody, plant material, nettles (without roots), veg and fruit waste, grass mowings and hay, coffee grounds, annual weeds. Solution - mix in high carbon 'Browns'. Examples - woody pruning (chopped up), straw, shredded paper, egg boxes (don't crush) and packing cardboard, sawdust. Turn or otherwise aerate your heap after adding, to introduce oxygen.

Dry/slow compost - Often too much brown material. Add 'greens' and in particular compost accelerators such as grass cuttings, chopped comfrey leaves...or even a certain high nitrogen human waste product (if the compost is for your own use).

Pests - these range from small flies to rats. The key rule is to keep your heap free of meat, fish, dairy and cooked food. This will also help to limit flies. Disturb the pile often....kick the compost bin when you go down the garden, and rats will often move on. If you do add anything that might attract flies, then cover it, or bury it in the pile. Best to site your compost heap away from the house too. Never add dog or cat poo (there is a risk of toxocara infection - serious for humans). We are planning to offer compost advice sessions later in the year, to assist beginners, encourage strugglers and provide experienced composters with food for thought. Watch this space.

The recent death of Ron Febrey is the loss of a friend to many, as well as the loss of a great worker in many aspects of our field which is divided into some 90 plots.

Derek Estcourt has been welcomed onto the committee and has agreed to organise the BBQ event later in the summer, which was created by Ron and has been a much-appreciated social event. Allotment holders have always been supporters of the Backwell Village Show in September, and we have now been given a tab on its website which we will make use of as one of our means of communication between allotment holders and to the public. This is a win-win arrangement as it saves us the effort of creating our own website and is an extra reason for people to use the site. backwellvillageshow.co.uk

The wildlife area, near the entrance to the field, has matured into an attractive feature, and we are grateful to our volunteers who oversee it, coordinated by Lorna. Bridget for Backwell

I have been impressed but not surprised by the fact that more than 1000 local residents objected to the Grove Farm Application. Below is what I wrote in response to the planning application.

As District Councillor for Backwell, I have taken a specific interest in this major development. To expand one village with a 25% increase in house numbers is not justified and would significantly impact the character of the existing community. I have a number of planning issues I wish to raise. I have followed closely the residents really significant number of objections. To have over 1000 residents' comment on one planning application is massive. It cannot and must not be dismissed lightly. I object to this development of over 500 homes on land outside the village boundary for many planning reasons. A village must have an identified boundary and for Backwell they have also chosen to have an adopted Neighbourhood Plan, the community have come together and identified the strategic growth, the sites for development and in addition there are other sites that have come forward that have permission. Backwell already has the housing growth allocated and to add this site would clearly be over development. The cumulative impact would be significant and the impact to existing residents would be negative. The Local Plan has not been to the inspector, and it has certainly not been adopted at this time of responding and reviewing the application. The site is on land that is currently good agricultural land, to plan for a sustainable future we need land to produce food not only housing and concrete over. I would seek to have brownfield sites developed and given permission first, I would ask the developer to evidence why this best and most versatile land is being pursued before other sites.

It is currently well used as a public amenity with many footpaths to open countryside. Introducing the new Biodiversity Net Gain law, we must see real evidence that the internationally important Greater Horseshoe Bats will not be negatively impacted by this proposed catastrophic change to landscape. This demonstrator species is well protected for a reason and the negative impacts of this development on wildlife and habitat is not justified (given the other developments already allocated in the village). A development of this scale would generate a significant increase in traffic on local roads including the A370, Station Road, Rodney Road, Chelvey Road. The junction of A370 and Station Road is already a major pinch point on the road networks of North Somerset, where Nailsea traffic (which continues to increase) meets A370 traffic from down in Weston direction mostly travelling to Bristol for a range of reasons. The impact of more road journeys is both to traffic levels (resulting in congestion) but also to air quality of the communities living on the A370. As far as I am aware North Somerset area does not yet have high levels, but I anticipate we will and the centre of the village is where children are walking to school, thee junior/infant and one secondary all in close proximity to A370 or Station Road as their walking routes. This is a major health concern and is about the future wellbeing of current population and future generations.

The applicant suggested there might be a bus route through Moor Lane and Station Road I would seriously question the deliverability of this and ask that this is investigated further as empty promises do

more damage to this community. It would also be very impactful on those residents near and around in Long Thorn and Moor Lane to have this additional route created.

The Train Station has not seen investment and remains inaccessible to those with physical disabilities, it is also already overcrowded at peak times, this is not a station with capacity to take more residents if they choose to use it.

North Somerset Council and National Government have declared a Climate Emergency this development is yet to evidence how it supports this work and doesn't generate a high emissions housing development.

I have strong objection to the timing of the application; it has not waited for a Local Plan process which is not yet approved or adopted therefore it is premature as well as the issues I have raised above which are not exhaustive.

Big Nath's BBQ

We are Big Nath's BBQ, a small business specialising in Texan style BBQ food. We've been tucked away in Church Town for two years now. You might well have smelt the waft of smoked briskets! This was our lockdown project - as Nathan, aka Big Nath - was made redundant from site management in construction at the beginning of the pandemic. So he spent the long summer of 2020 concocting his signature BBQ sauce and researching exactly where and how to start with a street food business. Meanwhile, Kinsey, his partner was still working as a psychiatric nurse. A few BBQs, in friend's backyards, later and we secured a shipping container kitchen in St Jude's, Bristol. From here we started takeaways and establishing ourselves in the Bristol hospitality scene. We soon outgrew that space and have happily been in the "quarry" for the past couple of years. We're now actually moving into a bigger premises here which will also be a BBQ school.

Our thing is smoking – we smoke our meats, classically brisket and pulled pork, using a mixture of hickory, maple and cherrywood, for at least 14 hours. We only ever use locally sourced and high welfare meat too – coming from Taunton/ Glastonbury. Our typical week finds us at street food markets in Bristol (Tobacco Factory, Temple Quay etc) but we also cater for weddings and other private events. We've got a very busy summer coming up which is great.

During our three years of trade we've had some wonderful experiences, food is about people after all! We've fed the Bristol Bears Rugby Team, won a BBQ trophy for best BBQ wing at Wing Fest, hosted wonderful supper clubs - including an annual Thanksgiving. Running this business is a lot of hard work but it's the people that make it.

So, if you'd like to come and find us – you can track us down for street food in Bristol (we keep a calendar on our website) or we do the first Friday of the month takeaways from our unit in Backwell. We hope to do some evenings at Belmont Estate this year too. We hope to see and feed you soon
